The School occupies a beautiful site that incorporates natural and landscaped grounds. The curriculum provides a solid foundation in literacy, numeracy geography, history and sciences with a robust programme of music, drama, visual arts, woodwork, technology and physical activity. The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Report Authority (ACARA) approves the School's curriculum.

The philosophy that underpins the education provides the basis for a universal education which has proved to be adaptable in diverse cultures across all continents. The education places the human being at the centre of all teaching and learning.

Message from our Board Chair

As we reflect on 2022, it is clear that this was an exceptionally challenging year, marked by the ongoing impact of COVID-19 restrictions, the rising cost of living, concerns about the School's financial position and leadership instability. Despite these challenges, our staff, parents, and students have shown resilience and adaptability, enabling our School to continue fulfilling its vision.

Governance

The Board thanks all members of the community for their feedback throughout the year. Community feedback provides vital support for the Board in the governance of the School.

On behalf of the School community, my gratitude and thanks go to the Directors, past and current, for their service on the Board. Directors provide significant time and expertise in a voluntary capacity. Their continued efforts are a valued contribution to the strategic direction, governance and leadership of the school.

The Orana Board is committed to improving governance and building our capacity. Legal firm Minter Ellison was engaged to advise on updates to the constitution. Focus was placed on consolidating and strengthening governance practice. This included adopting a Register of Interests to manage potential conflicts of interest.

The Board engaged The Association of Independent Schools NSW to evaluate our performance. The Board also held education sessions on financial stewardship, strategic communications, strategy and risk, strategic planning, child protection and safeguarding and cybersecurity. Policies on Child Protection, Related Party Transactions, Directors' Confidentiality, and Work Health and Safety (WHS) were reviewed and endorsed.

Finances

Another critical facet of the Board's remit is the School's financial management. In July 2022, a revised five-year forecast was presented. The projections were cause for concern but not alarm. It was clear that the Board needed to take positive steps to change the financial trajectory caused by lower-than-budgeted enrolment numbers. If left unaddressed, the situation will become critical in future years. This situation requires and will receive close attention and action from the Board.

Building projects

Early in the year, the Board approved the Visual Art/ Year 4 Building to move forward to the Building Approval stage. Unfortunately, the decision to build was set aside early in 2023 due to the rapid rise in building costs (over 25%) and interest rates. The decision will be reviewed when the financial situation is more favourable.

The Music Building also progressed to the detailed design phase (and as I write this report) construction has begun and is estimates to be completed in December 2023. The Board committed to this project, knowing there were cost increases because the Board understands the impact that infrastructure projects have on the advancement of the School. The Music building is within our Arts area, which benefits the whole School.

These projects represent significant steps forward in delivering our unique Steiner curriculum.

Keeping you informed

We know that it is important to provide our community with effective, transparent, and timely communication. In 2022 the Board began providing consistent reporting to the School community after each Board meeting. The Board will continue to provide the summary reports and manage the balance between too much communication and too little. Information sessions have been held throughout the year for staff and parents/carers.

Looking forward

The Board is committed to addressing the challenges and ensuring the School continues to provide a highquality education that aligns with the principles of Steiner education. The Board is well underway in developing the School's next strategic plan. The plan must respond to the challenging and constantly changing operating environment. The plan will be shared with the community for comment once the draft is sufficiently complete.

We are grateful for the ongoing support and dedication of our staff, parents, and students. We are confident that our collective efforts will enable Orana Steiner School to thrive in the years to come.



Professional development









Financial summary
